Specific information regarding the college-designated vendor, health records, and deadline dates will be included in the program acceptance letter and/or provided at the mandatory orientation session.

There is mandatory attendance at the new student orientation session upon acceptance into the program. Students who do not make admission but are given alternate candidate status will be required to attend orientation to be eligible to move to accepted status if a seat becomes available.

Program Admission Requirements:

WCC uses a competitive admission process for high demand programs in health care. Each year, approximately 100 students are accepted to the program; please see the application packet for the number of seats available each term. There are multiple requirements that must be completed prior to submitting an application for admission. Students with two WCC NUR course failures or withdrawals in failing status are not eligible to apply to this program. Applicants are required to meet all admission criteria and will be ranked based on a point system. The best qualified applicants will be selected for admission to the program. Student residency will be a weighted factor in the process. Regarding the new NUR 288 course which is replacing NUR 248 and NUR 258. Please update the APNURS and APNURL programs by removing NUR 248 (5 credits) and 258 (3 credits) and replacing them with NUR 288 (8 credits) effective Fall 2018.

They asked to create a new course (NUR 288) which was developed and approved to replace these two courses. Rationale for proposed changes or discontinuation:

Recognized a need to improve our NCLEX-RN first time pass rates after receiving a Michigan Board of Nursing warning letter. Faculty voted in Summer 2015 to add a required one credit NCLEX-RN review (formerly NUR 039) course to the 5th semester and decrease NUR 283 to a two credit course. Faculty also voted to align our curriculum with the BSN requirements for universities and agreed to eliminate HSC 101 (Medical Terminology), and MTH 167 (Math Applications for Health Sciences) and replace it with MTH 160 (Basic Statistics). Because of the number of students already in the process of completing the admissions and general education courses, MTH 160 will be added as an option and MTH 167 will be phased out.

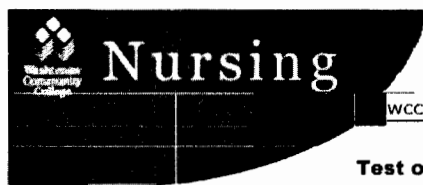
