#### **Course Objectives**

1. Read selected works of Shakespeare.
2. Identify the Shakespearean genres of comedy, history, tragedy, and romance.
3. Identify major themes in selected works of Shakespeare. For example, a. The comic vision b. The tragic vision c. The ambiguities of history d. The power of love e. The power of art f. Redemption and regeneration g. Sex and gender roles h. The nature of power i. The challenges of leadership j. Appearance vs. reality
4. Identify techniques employed in selected works of Shakespeare. For example, a. Rhyme b. Meter c. Iambic pentameter d. Blank verse e. Prose f. Irony g. Pun h. Act i. Scene
5. Define literary vocabulary that is applicable to the works of Shakespeare. For example, a. Sonnet b. Conflict c. Climax d. Soliloquy e. Aside f. Epilogue g. First Folio h. Quarto i. The Globe Theatre j. Blackfriars
6. Use literary vocabulary to discuss selected works of Shakespeare.
7. Explain the historical and cultural contexts that apply to selected works of Shakespeare.
8. Explain the major dramatic conflicts in selected works of Shakespeare.
9. Explain the stylistic techniques employed in selected works of Shakespeare
10. Interpret the motivations of dramatic characters in selected works of Shakespeare.
11. Interpret the themes in selected works of Shakespeare.
12. Evaluate the worth of selected works of Shakespeare.
13. Analyze, interpret, and evaluate selected works of Shakespeare in a formal essay.
