Unit #1 Introduction to Blues piano

- 1. The student will demonstrate the characteristics of Blues style piano.
- 2. The student will show knowledge of and execute the dominant 7th chord, which is the primary chord used when playing the Blues.
- 3. The student will demonstrate traditional Blues chord progressions.
- 4. The student will demonstrate different types of Blues style piano: Ragtime, Dixieland, Stride, Boogie Woogie, etc.

Unit #2 Blues style and phrasing

- 1. The student will execute the Blues scale.
- 2. The student will improvise a solo utilizing the Blues scale.
- 3. The student will apply dynamics using chords and melody.
- 4. The student will utilize musical characteristics such as quartertones and microtones or blue notes.

Unit #3 Blues form and structure

- 1. The student will demonstrate specific knowledge of the 12-Bar Blues structure.
- 2. The student will explain and demonstrate the II, V, I Chord progression.
- 3. The student will explain and demonstrate the I, IV, V Chord progression.
- 4. The student will explain and demonstrate chord substitutions.

Unit # 4 Blues improvisation

- 1. The student will explain and demonstrate how to improvise a solo over the 12-Bar Blues Chord progression.
- 2. The student will utilize the skills acquired from units #1, #2. and #3 and improvise a solo.
- 3. The student will demonstrate the four stages of a solo (1. Motive, 2.Development, 3. Climax, and 4. Closing Gesture) utilizing the Blues style.

Unit # 5 Introduction to Jazz piano

- 1. The student will explain the characteristics of Jazz piano.
- 2. The student will examine the primary chords used when playing Jazz piano.
- 3. The student will apply different types of Jazz progressions.

Unit # 6 Jazz style and phrasing

- 1. The student will demonstrate scales used in Jazz piano: Major, Minor, Melodic minor, Diminished, Blues etc.
- 2. The student will improvise a solo utilizing the fore mentioned scales.
- 3. The student will demonstrate the use of dynamics in Jazz.
- 4. The student will display knowledge of the musical characteristics of quartertones and microtones or blue notes as they pertain to Jazz.

Unit # 7 Jazz form and structure

- 1. The student will show knowledge of the 12 Bar Blues structure as it pertains to Jazz.
- 2. The student will explain the A, A, B, A song form.
- The student will give details and demonstrate the most commonly used chord progressions in Jazz such as the following.
 - A) II, V, I.
 - B) I, VI, II, V.
 - C) I, IV, V.
 - D) I, II, III, IV
- The student will explain and demonstrate how to improvise a solo utilizing the fore mentioned chord progressions.
- 4. The students will explain and demonstrate Jazz chord substitutions.
- 5. The student will execute complex Jazz piano voicing and chord inversions.

Unit #8 Jazz chords and rhythms

- 1. The student will perform different types of rhythms associated with Jazz.
- 2. The student will demonstrate different types of Jazz style piano: Swing, Straight Ahead or Be-Bop, Cool, Latin, Contemporary, etc.

Unit #9 Improvising a Jazz solo

- 1. The student will demonstrate the four stages of a solo (1. Motive, 2.Development, 3. Climax, and 4. Closing Gesture) utilizing the Jazz style.
- 2. The student will create a "Jazz feel" by making a solo swing.
- 3. The student will give details and demonstrate how to improvise a solo with the changes.
