Proposed Start Semester: Winter 2015 Course Description: In this course, students receive an overview of tools used to assess the co-occurrence of mental illness and substance abuse. Students are introduced to basic mental

illness concepts presented in the current Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) and explore the influence and interaction of substance abuse related to mental illness. In addition, students will be provided with ethical guidelines related to working with assessing and treating addiction.
