Subject	Object	Possessive
I	me	my/mine
you	you	your/yours
he	him	his
she	her	her/hers
it	it	its
we	us	our/ours
they	them	their/theirs
who	whom	whose

## Notice the pronouns in the following sentences.

- After the poetry reading, his wife and (<u>he</u> / him) went to The Earle for coffee and dessert.
  *He* is the correct pronoun because it functions as a subject: *he went*.
- 2. The agent handed over the contracts to Christina and (I / me).

Me is the correct pronoun because it functions as an object: handed over the contracts to me.

3. (Us / We) teachers and students at WCC should demand free lunches.

We is the correct pronoun because it functions as a subject: <u>We</u> should demand.

4. Diana Hacker is a better grammarian than (I / me).

*I* is the correct pronoun because it functions as a subject: *better grammarian than <u>I</u> (am)*.

5. Lars wasn't sure (who / whom) would ask him to the Sweethearts Dance.

Who is the correct pronoun because it functions as a subject: <u>he/she</u> would ask him.

- Carmen wasn't sure (who / whom) she would ask to the Sweethearts Dance.
  Whom is the correct pronoun because it functions as an object: him/her she would ask.
- 7. The dog chasing (its/it's) tail is (yours/your's).

*Its* is the correct pronoun because it is possessive: *the tail belonging to the <u>it</u>*. *Yours* is the correct pronoun because it is possessive: *the dog belonging to <u>you</u>*.
