# **Titles of Works**

## **Capitalization**

- 1. <u>Capitalize</u> the first letter of the <u>first word</u>, the <u>last word</u>, and <u>every major word</u> in the title of a work.
- 2. Major words include everything except articles (a, an, the), prepositions (Ex.: in, on, with), and conjunctions (Ex.: and, but, or).

### **Examples**

Go Tell It on the Mountain

"Stairway to Heaven"

Dancing with the Stars

"The Jilting of Granny Weatherall"

The Sound and the Fury

## **Underlining, Italics, or Quotation Marks**

1. <u>Italicize or underline</u> the titles of <u>books</u>, <u>book-length poems</u>, <u>periodicals</u>, <u>films</u>, <u>TV programs</u>, Web sites, and CDs.

Note: Italicizing and underlining mean the same thing. Use one or the other—not both.

### Examples

A Writer's Reference (book)
Beowulf (book-length poem)
The Huron River Review (periodical)
The Wizard of Oz (film)
Leave It to Beaver (TV program)
Wikipedia (Web site)
Blood on the Tracks (CD)

2. Use <u>quotation marks</u> for the titles of <u>short stories</u>, <u>essays</u>, <u>poems</u>, and <u>songs</u>.

### Examples

"A Rose for Emily" (short story)
"A White Woman of Color" (essay)
"The Road Not Taken" (poem)
"Chain of Fools" (song)
